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Karen Students Overcome Challenges as Refugees to Achieve Dream of Higher Education

One of the newly emerging Asian American and Pacific Islander (AAPI) communities in the United States is the Karen (pronounced Kah-Ren) population. The Karen community fled Burma, also known as Myanmar, due to political oppression with many heading to refugee camps in Thailand and eventually immigrating to the United States. Many Karen refugees have settled in Minnesota, Nebraska, New York, Pennsylvania, Oregon, Texas, Washington and Wisconsin.

As this population grows, APIASF has seen an increase in applicants as well as scholarship recipients. One such student is Poe Dee, a 2012 - 2013 APIASF / Coca-Cola Foundation Scholar, from Lincoln, Nebraska. Dee is pursuing a degree in Political Science at Wayne State College and hopes to pursue a career in law.



"I have seen Karen people suffer under the dictatorship in Burma, and now in America they face new challenges because they do not have the life skills or legal knowledge expected of American citizens," said Dee. "I will try to explore the laws of the land and work hard until I become a quality lawyer so I can continue to help the Karen community reach their fullest potential in the United States."

Dee has already made a tremendous impact in his community by developing a network for the Karen community in his area. He schedules doctor's appointments, serves as an interpreter and helps address other needs of refugee families.

"Volunteer work has given me the opportunity to serve as a leader and has ultimately influenced my goals," said Dee. "By earning a high school diploma, a college degree and graduating from law school, I will serve as a role model for future Karen academics and the larger community."
